The district plans to increase indoor air quality in all rooms by repairing/replacing windows and HVAC units throughout the school

The district will use funds to provide an after school tutoring program to at risk students in grades K-8, will implement a summer learning program to supplement the typical school year. The district will incorporate homework help into their after school child care program. The district will also provide educational opportunities that are outside of the current budget to both at risk students and G&T students with these funds. The district will schedule educational assemblies and PD programs designed to support our current academic programs.
